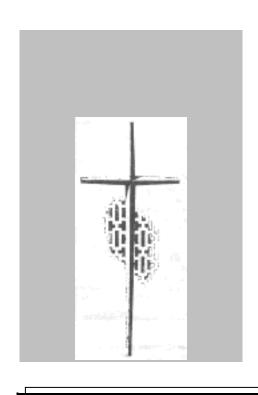

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Ha Na's Annual Minister's Report

Easter Greetings

Happy greetings to all the Easter people of Immanuel,

I can't believe it has been two years since I started sharing the life and ministry of my vocation with my newly embraced Immanuel people. As I write this Annual Minister's Report, it is April 24th, three days after Easter Sunday.

As I recollect what I shared in my Easter sermon, I realize that the message is close to my heart and applicable to a reflection on *ministry* at Immanuel in the present.

"To the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20)

The name given to Jesus at birth is Emmanuel, from which our own church's name comes; it means "God is with us." Interestingly, the final words of the risen Jesus also echo his name: "I am with you always, to the end of the age." We, as the church, especially as one whose name was chosen to be Immanuel, are called to live the life that matches our name: to truly trust that God is with us to the end of the age. Jesus lives, and God's divine work continues to the end of our time, and beyond. What it means to me is that we have no reason to panic. Easter's promise is that in faith, we are encouraged to live and capable of living the reality of new life, always, in all circumstances. An empty tomb means what we are looking for is not in the tomb. What we are looking for - - the living person, Jesus, and the mission of the Easter community - - is both in the village and in the wilderness where terror and amazement, fear and great joy, these contrasting realities, would free us, and transform us, rather than freeze us. Let us ask, then, how can this reflection on an empty tomb be applied to the life and work of Immanuel? What is our terror now, and what is our amazement yet to see? First, the terror: The promised (?) financial uplift from the construction of Kimberly Terrace is delayed. We might not be able to cover the deficit in 2019-20, not like the previous years in which we could cover the deficits by using money out of pocket. This situation distresses us, temporarily or for a significant while.

Good news

The good news, to my understanding, is that my recent Easter experience enabled me to examine and discard my misunderstanding about where we must find Easter hope. I scrutinize my inner thinking: Have I ever believed the cash flow from Kimberly Terrace to be a true source of hope? It is true that I had been thinking that the financial uplift from the property development could help us live comfortably, and make us ok. This, then, made me think that I could delay or should delay my aspiration to start a new ministry, for example, an intercultural Messy Church, until we secure financial sustainability, because financial security makes starting and continuing new ministry easier; it may even guarantee its success.

Easter faith

However, my Easter experience remind me that the mystery of Easter is not the tomb, but the empty tomb. Easter faith cannot be delayed, must not be delayed. If you have intention, if you have passion, if you have a desire for a new, bold ministry, it shouldn't wait until you hear that the construction of Kimberly Terrace has started. Nothing other than faith can save us and make us live.

Ministry of thanksgiving

Through the past year, 2018-19, I continued to nurture a ministry of thanksgiving and gratitude because everything I call my ministry at Immanuel was only possible with the hard work and wonderful support of many people, especially the Guiding and Council Elders and all who gave themselves quietly behind the scenes or actively, in great visible ways. To name a few highlights, I developed an Intercultural Messy Church plan with Jen Saner-Harvey (the grant money of \$1,500 is still in our hands, unused); a new website is in progress (We have most of the content - new or

updated - we need to put on. Scott Douglas is developing the website design and framework); Council and I studied Fishing Tips: How Curiosity Transformed a Community of Faith, by John Pentland, and Open Questions (from Governance and Ministry, by Don Hochkins). The best lesson that Council gleaned from Fishing Tips has been, "Pay for What You Want, not What You Have." This means that we need to develop an excellent understanding of our priorities and what we value most, and shift our perspective to investing in the future, following our values and priorities, not just using what is left over. According to Pentland, at the start, paying for what you want often equates with paying for who you want (staffing). It requires us to trust that what we want matters. We have given the priority to growth in children's ministry, and as a result, we've seen the growth of Sunday School and children's participation in the worship and life of Immanuel - - supported by the successful ministry of two Sunday School Directors, Jen and Aisha, and our volunteer teachers. By the way, the children have chosen a new name to call themselves: Immanuel Church Changers!

I also must acknowledge the exceptional, dedicated and inspiring ministry and work of all of our Guiding Elders, and especially, for me, Pastoral Care Elders and Worship Elders. Muriel Kenyon and Joan Macdonald, Lynne Strome and Leslie Donnelly are my go-to-people 7 days a week, whenever I have questions or need to plan together. They are a great team! The highlights of my year are deeply heart-felt pastoral care visits, Concordia Village Communions (seasonally), creative and well-coordinated and organized special services and Sunday services. (Any technical hiccups like those of the Christmas Eve service at 7 pm are all mine.) All of our Guiding and Council Elders, leaders and worshippers make Immanuel's ministry authentic and strong every day, and all of our church members' warm support, generous kind words and constructive feedback on my ministry and Sunday sermons make me proud to be at Immanuel. I especially enjoyed sharing the Interfaith series through the season of Epiphany, 2019.

Council's Planning Retreat in March, 2019

Here, I would like to report what I shared with our Council Elders at our Planning Retreat (Mar 15th) and link it to the reflection on Easter faith. Some background details:

With Council Elders' support, I cautiously yet sincerely aspire for Immanuel to continue our ministry with Easter faith, embracing both terror and amazement, fear and great joy, in the upcoming year of 2019-2020. Anxiety may be a reasonable human response to uncertainty, yet it's not the best response. Remembering and practicing Easter faith with an excellent ministry focus would be a wise response to our (predicted) "limbo" time of uncertainty and waiting. Like the women on Easter morning, we understand that there's nothing to see in the tomb, "'Cause it is empty."

We hope that **Open Questions** can equip us, Easter sojourners, with focus and curiosity when we come out of the empty tomb.

Last March, Council Elders and I planned a retreat to identify three Open Questions.

In a nutshell, Open Questions are future and mission oriented, open-ended questions, used as a way for Council to open themselves up to congregational influence and to facilitate congregational participation. Council is responsible for identifying Open Questions, seeking input and feedback from the congregation about them by hosting wider conversations with the congregation. The paid accountable ministers like myself and the staff are responsible for developing strategic planning and implementing new goals.

During the half-day retreat, including lunch, the Elders *patiently* trusted my facilitation and answered:

- What things have we done well in the past, and how do we carry them on to the future?
- What is our context in the present?

What is changing? (in the world, in your neighbourhood, in your family)

What is not changing?

What is happening? (at Immanuel)

What is not happening?

What do you want to see happening? What matters most to you?

- Based on the shared learnings from the discussions today and in your faith, what is the future of Immanuel you want to share with our next generation? Dream and describe.
- Translate them into Open Questions.

Open Questions

As the result of the deep conversations that followed, Council Elders could identify three Open Questions, and all of us ended the retreat happily, with consensus and relief (!). The Open Questions that Council Elders and I will share with the congregation to seek input and feedback and eventually to develop strategic planning are:

How might Immanuel encourage diversity?

How can the arts provide spiritual nurture and invite participation by the community?

As a church that contributed to colonization, how shall we express our commitment to TRC?

Note: Our first Wider Conversation will be held on May 5th, with Guiding Elders/Council/M & P. I express my deepest thanks to the Discerning of Gifts Cluster Guiding Elders to agree to host this Conversation with me.

Queer and Faithful

Last but not least, I have devoted a lot of hours and work to co-organizing and planning the Queer and Faithful conference/event (May 25-26, 2019). It originated from my own experience and learning, and since I proposed the idea at the Affirming Ministry Network (Winnipeg Presbytery) meeting in January, 2018, the group of co-organizers grew and grew and became a very diverse interfaith team. Queer and Faithful will be a two-day event featuring Two Spirit indigenous and LGBTQ+ speakers from diverse religious/spiritual and cultural/ethnic backgrounds. ALL are welcome to come share, discuss, and learn about the intersections of Faith, Race, and Queerness. The theme speaker and workshop presenter will be Jenna Tenn-Yuk from Toronto. I found Jenna by reading her article in the United Church magazine, the Observer, (now Broadview): "For Queer Christians of Colour, Finding Church Isn't Easy."

Is it Immanuel's Ministry?

Organizing this conference might look unrelated and distant from the ministry of Immanuel. However, my hope is that I can convince the people of Immanuel that it is related and relevant to this church's passion and goals. Queer and Faithful centres the experience and voices of queer (LGBTQ) people of colour who have to navigate multiple hurdles towards full acceptance in their lifetime: in their home, in society, even in the LGBTQ community and, particularly, in their faith community, including churches. To illustrate, Queer people of colour/faith often experience multiple levels of "homelessness." First, in the LGBTQ community, *faith* is a tricky subject and the conversation on it is largely avoided due to the abusive history of the churches towards LGBTQ people. It is similar to the abusive history of the churches towards the Indigenous people. Therefore, it creates "spiritual homelessness." Second, if they are queer people of *colour*, finding a church isn't easy because, even if they have found an affirming church, most affirming churches are predominately White

congregations. Third, to the present day, the reality is that "most" churches are, sadly, not affirming, and therefore most queer Christians, regardless of their skin-colour, if they still choose to go to church, have to **hide** their sexuality. Needless to say, they have to do the very difficult journey of reconciling their faith and sexuality on their own.

I am grateful that one of our Open Questions is, "How might Immanuel encourage diversity?" My hope for Immanuel is (even though I am clearly aware that there can be many interpretations and visions in regards to what it means to encourage diversity) that Immanuel continues an Easter faith ministry towards becoming a truly affirming, decolonizing and intercultural congregation **where queerness, race and faith can all belong**. In other words, queer Christians of colour can find a home, build friendships and thrive at Immanuel, be comfortable in their skin here, able to nurture their spirituality. If we can do this, we can do any intercultural ministry and can be successful.

Not by 'assimilation' but by 'transformation'

New, bold ministry cannot come by 'assimilation.' We cannot expect new people, "curious people", to come and fit in with us, assume our norms and our expectations and the existent ministry. To be a successful ministry, we need to create a new core inside the core or running in parallel. All cultures, all churches, all leaderships go through the process of "normalization". It is just natural, and essential. However, for a successful intercultural ministry, de-normalizing is a necessary process. Immanuel, too, shares certain expectations and norms, and unconsciously might impress these commonalities to newcomers as the conditions of acceptance. I believe encouraging diversity through inviting those who are unlike us and letting them make this place their home is how we will thrive together. How to let our comfortable ways die is as relevant and important as how to live with magnificent uncertainty.

Easter faith cannot be delayed and must not be delayed. If we have intention, if we have passion, if we have this desire for a new, bold ministry, we must do it in urgency and with the courage to embrace both the terror and amazement, fear and great joy that the women experienced in the early Easter sunrise. Only such an Easter faith will save us and make us fully alive.

Immanuel United Church Annual Meeting

May 13, 2018

Call to Order: 11:45

Appointment of Chair and Secretary; Ha Na requested permission to accept Robert Smith as chair and Judy Gierys as secretary for the purpose of this Annual Meeting. Congregation agreement received.

Acknowledgment of Treaty #1 Land and Homeland of the Métis Nation.

Motion to enable Constitution of the Court;

Jane Nicholls; Be it resolved all participating in this meeting who are not members of Immanuel United Church have the rights to full participation including speaking and voting the same as congregation members. Motion seconded by Marg Smith and carried.

Time of Remembrance; Names projected and read by Kerry LaRocque

Approval of the previous meeting minutes.

Marvee Stevens motioned to approve the May 14, 2017 Annual Meeting minutes and the July 8, 2018, Congregational Meeting minutes. Motion seconded by Lynne Strome and carried.

Financial Report; brief overview by Pat Schulz and Connie Kryschuk

Operational Deficit; Pat Schulz moved that the Congregational Events fund be reduced by \$5,229.89 to offset the Operational Deficit. Motion seconded by Connie Kryschuk and carried. Pat Schulz moved that the balance of \$2,723.91 be moved from Congregational Events fund to the Staffing fund. Motion seconded by Connie Kryschuk and carried.

Back 40; a brief update by Bob Kenyon. Property name changed to Kimberly Terrace. Financial Manager named as Eugene Antymis. Signing authority given to Bob Kenyon, Eugene Antymis and Judy Gierys.

Annual Reports; Joy Weizel motioned to approve the reports as written. Motion seconded by Leslie Ross and carried.

New Business

Sunday School Coordinator; Jane Nicholls motioned with the consent and recommendation of Council that the funding for the Sunday School Coordinator position be continued. Motion seconded by Marvee Stevens and carried.

Discernment of Gifts; Cindy Smyth motioned to confirm Miriam Unruh for Living out our Faith in the World, Leslie Ross for Faith Formation and Life-Long Learning and Judy Gierys for Worship. Motion seconded by Marg Smith and carried.

Presentation and Approval of Operations Budget; Pat Schulz moved that the Operations Budget for the year 2018-2019 projecting an Operational shortfall of \$26,073.00 be approved. Motion seconded by Connie Kryschuk and recommended by Council. Motion carried.

Financial Appeal; Ian Donnelly, with the recommendation of Council moved that a committee of 3 to 5 people be created to implement a special fund raising appeal to take place in the fall 2018 to address a portion of the projected shortfall. Motion was seconded by Joy Weizel and carried. Volunteers were requested. Ian Donnelly and Connie Kryschuk indicated interest.

Immanuel United Church Congregational Meeting

Sunday November 11, 2018

Call to Order; 12:20 Bob Kenyon

Motion to appoint Chair and Secretary: Bob Kenyon asked for a motion to allow Robert Smith as Chair and Judy Gierys as secretary. Lynne Strome motioned to allow. Motion seconded by Cathy Haining and carried.

Motion to Extend Privileges; Joy Weizel motioned that privileges be extended to all participating in this meeting who are not members of Immanuel United Church. Motion seconded by Debbie Bilous and carried.

Meeting Details; Robert Smith provided a brief synopsis of what the meeting is about. Gordon Gray of Discovery Homes explained what had been happening over the past few months and where he is now proposing things go. He assured the congregation of their continued commitment to provide payment for the land and

\$10,000 per unit as if they were selling. They will be utilizing a CMHC program that assures the rent will be 10% below the average market rents for 10 years.

Background; On October 23rd 2016, Immanuel United Church approved an agreement with Discovery Homes to sell the "Back 40" for the purpose of constructing approximately 22 condominium units in 3 buildings. Discovery Homes agreed to pay the appraised value of the land plus \$10,000 for each condo as they are sold. Since that time Discovery Homes held public consultations and followed all the required steps to obtain City of Winnipeg approval to proceed with the development. In spite of considerable expense preparing architectural drawings and marketing the condos, it has not been successful. Discovery Homes is now seeking to modify the agreement with Immanuel United Church to instead construct approximately 24-34 units of rental housing to be rented at 10% below average rental costs for the first 10 years.

Motion; Bob Kenyon motioned that Immanuel United Church modify its agreement with Discovery Homes to include the following:

- the construction of approximately 24 to 34 rental apartments with rents 10% less the market value for 10 years (affordable housing).
 - two appraisals of the property be undertaken by Discovery Homes, and that the average to determine the price of the land.
 - A meeting to take place between respective lawyers to adjust the previous agreement.

• That the same financial terms as the previous agreement remain in place and further that the Immanuel congregation direct its trustees to sign the agreement on its behalf after the lawyers have reviewed it in order that the project may proceed.

Council Elders Annual Report

Report of the Immanuel Council

The Council Elders have continued to meet monthly over the last year. Each Council meeting is facilitated by one elder and another elder scribes what is discussed. The scribe then gives an oral report to the congregation shortly after the meeting. This is done on a rotational basis. We begin each meeting reading aloud and reflecting on the Immanuel United Church Mission Statement. We have occasionally invited Guiding Elders from one of the Mission Clusters to come to a Council meeting to report on the ministries included in their cluster and share with us successes and concerns they may have as they go about the work in which they are engaged. In addition, each Council member is now responsible for connecting with and supporting one Mission Cluster and providing reports to the full Council as needed. The clusters have been very committed in their work and we are grateful and appreciative of all special tasks handled. At each meeting we also review and discuss the previous month's Financial Statement and Financial Summary provided by the church Treasurer. We are grateful to the Treasurer and Finance Team for their dedication in reporting and keeping all Immanuel's financial details accurate and up to date.

Ha Na continues to uplift and challenge us to think in new ways. In particular, we have been learning about and formulating "Open Questions" which may help us to determine future directions for Immanuel. We held a Council retreat in March and came up with three open questions. We are planning a congregational event in the fall. At our meetings we continue to discuss the progress of the Back Forty project, now to be known as Kimberly Terrace.

Joy Weizel will be leaving the Council as of June. We thank her for her wisdom and service to the church. We are praying that 3 people will discern an ability and willingness to serve on Council in the coming year.

We are grateful to be able to serve Immanuel in the capacity of Council Elders and look forward to the challenges of the coming year as we faithfully attempt to live out God's will for us. Respectfully submitted by:

Kimberly Terrace Update

To begin with I would refer you to the Annual Meeting report on November 11, 2018. This brought us up to date in regards to cancelling the original plan and describing the new plan.

Since that time, the new preliminary drawings needed to be approved by the City (still there as of today) and two appraisals are underway. The average of the two appraisals will be the cost of the property that Immanuel will be paid.

In addition we will be paid \$10,000 for each of 24 units. We still need to meet with the lawyers to change the agreement on paper.

Hopefully by the time you read this, all those previous items have happened and we have some idea when construction may begin.

WORSHIP 20%

Central to the life of the Immanuel United Church congregation is Sunday morning worship. It is the time when the church community gathers to be nourished through biblical stories of our faith and the reflection thereon by our minister. The service is enhanced with musical offerings by the choir and the organist. The Sacrament of Communion is offered the first Sunday of the month. Children are welcome in the service but may also participate in Sunday School. In addition to our ministry personnel, members of the congregation are involved in Sunday morning worship by leading, greeting, collecting offering, counting offering, serving communion, singing in the choir, musical accompaniment, making announcements, reading scripture, writing and offering prayer, operating the sound system, making and serving coffee, clearing snow and/or cutting grass.

PASTORAL CARE 4%

Supporting and caring for our members takes place in many ways, and in many locations. Funeral and wedding services as well as visits in homes, hospitals and care homes are the most obvious places. However, a significant amount of pastoral care happens when we gather for worship or for congregational events such as the fowl supper, the dessert theatre and/or the retirees' lunches. Pastoral care also is extended by our congregational members at the food bank, the breakfast program at a local school, SNOW Night and Just Christmas. A Memorial Fund is available for contributions of condolence.

LIFE LONG LEARNING 5%

As well as Sunday School for children, adult study groups have been a tradition at Immanuel. Study groups are largely self-funded and, as such, are not reflected as a significant percentage of the budget. There are several long time, on-going groups. Short-term gatherings also take place on occasion (e.g. Advent reflection group or a special study on a book).

CONGREGATIONAL LIFE TOGETHER 12%

In addition to being an opportunity to learn, study gatherings have proven to be a great place to get to know one another. The pre-Advent dinner, Fowl Supper, Easter morning breakfast and after-service coffee times are also occasions when there is opportunity to share and hear what is going on in the lives of one another.

OUTREACH to the COMMUNITY 4%

Many years ago the congregation of Wesley United Church made a decision to not build a sanctuary but rather to continue worshiping in a smaller portion of the planned building. This decision meant that time and money could be used to reach out to the community as needs arose. In 1974 Wesley United and Morse Place United Churches amalgamated to become Immanuel United Church which continues to focus much attention on needs beyond our neighbourhood. Ongoing financial and volunteer support for a school breakfast program, hosting a food bank and involvement in an alternative Christmas bazaar, Just Christmas, are a few of such endeavours. Additionally, Immanuel supports community ministry programs through the umbrella group, One Just City.

WIDER CHURCH 5%

Immanuel has always contributed to the work of the wider church in Winnipeg by on-going donations and volunteering in support of outreach ministries. With the Presbytery structure dissolving, support is given through the umbrella group, One Just City. Many members keep abreast of happenings in the wider church through subscription to the Observer.

MISSION & SERVICE 15%

In support of needs beyond our city, Immanuel contributes to the mission and service of the United Church. In doing so, our offerings are supportive of Global and Canadian justice initiatives, Aboriginal ministries and right relations, Community ministries, Theological education, Faith formation - youth, camping, intercultural engagement, remote ministries and Innovation in communities of Faith. 2019- 2020 OPERATIONS DEFICIT

The finance team has looked at the Operational Expenses for the next year and compared the numbers to the Operational Income and the result is a projected deficit of \$36,043.00. We feel a portion of this deficit could be covered from the Congregational Events Fund, the Memorial Life and Work Fund and earned interest on the bank accounts.

This leaves a deficit balance of \$24,189.73. Unless we receive a significant infusion of money, we will need to cover this deficit by taking this money from our designated funds. This would leave Immanuel in a very precarious financial situation. Of the money we will receive from the sale of our property, only a portion is designated to sustain ourselves. Therefore, we need to be planning long term for Immanuel's future viability.

Financial Audit of Immanuel United Church 2019

We have reviewed the accounts of Immanuel United Church, made available to us for the period May 1st, 2017 to April 30th, 2018, including statements of revenue, expenditures, requisitions, cheques, deposit slips, payroll records and remittances to Canada Revenue Agency. We made a detailed examination of the randomly selected months of June 2017 and January 2018. These represent the 2017/2018 fiscal year of Immanuel United Church. In this detailed examination, we confirmed all revenues and deposits, confirmed withdrawals or payments for budgeted items and for employees' salaries and benefits. These were checked against the statements of the financial institution, the Assiniboine Credit Union. We also confirmed the statements of the Savings accounts and Term deposits. We found the records to be complete and in good order.

In our opinion, the financial records have been well kept. In our examination, we found no evidence of error or incompetence. We commend the Finance Team for their most efficient work and on behalf of the congregation express our appreciation for their work.

We provide the following information to inform the congregation;

- The procedure for recording individual gifts is: (1) envelope givings, open offerings and Sunday School givings are recorded and balanced each week. (2) Contributions by Pre-authorized Remittance (PAR) and service charges for same are recorded once each month. (3) Envelope numbers and PAR accounts are entered into computer files which designate breakdown to Local, Mission and Service and Other. (4) This breakdown of categories is printed and forwarded to the Treasurer. (5) Givings records are accumulated in the computer file for Income Tax statements. (6) The Finance Team checks with the Credit Union to verify their total deposit figures with the deposit sheet. (7) Envelopes are retained for two years. We find no fault with this procedure.
- Post-dated cheques: cheque dates are noted as the envelopes are opened. Post-dated cheques are filed by the Finance Team and submitted on the effective date.

We make the following recommendations/reminders;

- 1. On occasion there are still offering envelopes that do not show the amount of the gift or the intended distribution of the gift. Although the cash counters are instructed to enter a figure for the amount enclosed, they cannot mark the distribution of the gift. The Finance Team, acting on the pledge of the donor, makes the distribution. This involves an unnecessary action on their part. If there is no recorded pledge there is no guide for the Finance Team. The total contribution is then marked "local". We urge all contributors to be sure to mark the amount of their gift and the desired distribution of it.
- 2. We strongly recommend continued use of the "Requisition for Payment" form when committees and/or individuals are submitting claims for payment.
- 3. Special Events: we recommend that when committees are given an advance or "float" it would be wise to keep a separate record of all expenditures. At the conclusion of the special event the planning or organizing committee should submit a report of all transactions to the Finance Team.
- 4. We recommend that this report be received by the Council and that the Audit report be included with the Annual Report for 2017/2018.

Faith Formation and Lifelong Learning Cluster

Sunday School Annual Report~Aisha Tahir, Sunday School Director



It has been a great joy to have the opportunity to deepen my exploration of faith and spirituality with Immanuel United Church.



I came here to learn and also teach the future Immanuel Church Changers from an informed interfaith perspective. Feeling insecure about my lack of United Church experience teaching lessons, I approached my position as the Sunday school director with the self study method I use in my Anglican Christian studies with my children. I expanded my own approach and stayed flexible to make room for other learners and their beliefs. Ha Na guided me and provided resources during our

check-in's and Leslie also played a very supportive role with informing me of United Church organization cluster groups functions. Additional volunteers and teaching mentors like Marianne have helped me by providing positive and negative feedback in kind and generous ways.

Immanuel United Church has a diverse group of inter-generational learners and we can see approximately 10 to 15 folks participate in the Sunday school Children's program. Sometime in November snacks were being provided regularly which also increased the number of participants attending programming on a regular basis. Providing snacks also made new members and visiting guests feel welcome to Sunday school. Food also became a teaching tool for themes such as Harvest and living a fruitful life. The physical classroom space has been a playground for innovative ideas when it comes to exploring all the liturgical seasons with Jesus.



Every week each lesson is carefully researched for its concepts and ideas to be explored from several different approaches, to facilitate all the known learning abilities of Sunday school program participants. I use the weekly scripture readings that Ha Na uses for the sermon portion of the larger worship. As Ha Na and I teach each other about our deeper understanding of the subjected scriptures with a healthy exchange of cultural and inter faith knowledge. This dialogue is bridged into an experiential methodology and becomes the foundation of the discussions we have during 'circle time' with the Sunday school group. Working with Ha Na makes me expand my vocabulary and her kind reminders to use words with more mindfulness and inclusion, also broadened my skills when communicating with English as a Second language folks.

The Immanuel Church Changers is a name we spent some time as a group forming for ourselves as we pledged to have fun and love God as we know God to love us. The group grows larger and diverse in their Christian understandings in developing multilayered spiritual concepts of Jesus. They continue to create distinction in government 'holiday' Themes vs the liturgical themes of Church communities. I believe it is important to nurture each persons ideas, beliefs and values. I facilitate in their exploration of those concepts on their own terms, I teach them to gather their manna at Immanuel U.C and to go on that journey with confidence. My position is to remind them of the

promise of Gods Love for us and to affirm the supportive community of Immanuel United Church

which they belong to.



Participants are encouraged to ask questions and openly acknowledge their quest for answers. A participant felt safe to share during circle time once "Why do we have to come to church anyways" so we openly discussed that idea and came to the conclusion that we got together every Sunday just to practice Jesus love with her friends in the Immanuel United Church space but home days on Sundays are important too. It was imperative for me to teach from a land-based perspective, for that I emphasized on our responsibilities as stewards of this land. We became change makers by writing letters to our Federal government leaders. When activities were planned for weekly learnings there was a great emphasis made on connecting with the space be it in a circle on the floor or huddled up in front of a tv on the couch.

There were challenges keeping the diverse age group occupied at times. The older participants can sometimes whip through a lesson or activity in 5 minutes while the younger ones have no interest or vice versa. By setting up several stations and activity centres we were able to efficiently use our time together for richer learning experiences. Volunteer support has also been extremely helpful at assisting me with the younger participants. I learned new ways to challenge my participants by asking for feedback which they valued and appreciated the feeling of being heard in the space.

With Immanuel United Church's willingness to be open to diversity, ecumenism and interfaith dialogues the joy has been mine to be welcomed here. We have explored themes of traveling and water with diverse faith concepts the learnings here are truly rich. The gift of Coexistence and Peace is what we give to each other regardless of age, race, creed, gender, origin or orientation. All are welcome here indeed and our Sunday School program has been a testament of this practice.



Annual Report of the Wednesday Afternoon Womens' Study Group

This group has been meeting for about 35 years. It met for many years in the evening but moved to an afternoon time in recent years as most of the group retired. Some members have been with the group since the beginning but others have come and gone over the years.

The focus of study has been theology - feminist, liberation, etc - as well as current social issues and sometimes poetry. For the past few years we have been learning and studying about a new (to us) understanding of Canadian history—the impact of settlers and colonial practices on First Nations who have inhabited the land for centuries. Discussions are lively and enlightening. We have shared in Sunday worship services some of what we are discovering. We occasionally look at other study topics and have also organized a retreat on "hope" using reflections by writer/artist Jan Richardson. We meet the second and fourth Wednesday of the month with a break over summer. We gather at 1 for a social time then begin our study time at 1:30 to 3:30. There is no homework because we read together as a group and then talk about what we've read. The group itself has lots of resources amongst its members. We meet both at the church and in members homes. There are 12 in the group right now and we would welcome newcomers. Call the church office if you are interested in connecting with us.

Thursday Morning Study Group

The Thursday Morning Study Group continues to meet weekly at 9:30 am in the upstairs lounge, with between 6 and 8 members attending. We collect a small donation each week. This year the proceeds will again be used to pay down the outstanding amount in the chairlift fund.

Last May we hosted the Mother's Day Tea featuring the "The Perfect Fifth". All proceeds from this event will be used to reduce the deficit in the chairlift fund. The annual "Rewind Concert" was not held this year.

We completed the book: Kitchen Table Wisdom: Stories that Heal by Rachel Naomi Remen, M.D. This New York Times-bestseller, addresses the same spiritual issues that made the original a bestseller: suffering, meaning, love, faith, and miracles. As of January, we began reading Factfulness: Ten Reasons We're Wrong About the World--and Why Things Are Better Than You Think by Hans Rosling. In this book, Hans Rosling, Professor of International Health, together with his two long-time collaborators, Anna and Ola, offers a radical new explanation of why this happens. They reveal the ten instincts that distort our perspective—from our tendency to divide the world into two camps (usually some version of us and them) to the way we consume media (where fear rules) to how we perceive progress (believing that most things are getting worse). It turns out that the world, for all its imperfections, is in a much better state than we might think. To bring one of the points in this book to life, our group met at Eileen Metcalfe's to view a movie titled: The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind: a remarkable true story about human inventiveness and its power to overcome crippling adversity. It will inspire anyone who doubts the power of one individual's ability to change his community and better the lives of those around him. We were also provided by a with a lovely lunch after the movie. At Christmas the study group met at the "Jonesy's Restaurant" in Birds Hill for our annual year end lunch, and will plan to wind up in June with another lunch. There are currently no plans to continue meeting over the summer.

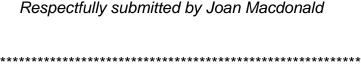
