WELCOME AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

OPENING STATEMENT

In the season of Epiphany, we continue to witness how God's light is revealed in the world not through power or privilege, but through lives shaped by justice, humility, and compassion. Today's scriptures invite us to consider what it truly means to live as God's people, called to walk gently, love mercy, and reflect Christ's wisdom in a divided world.

CALL TO WORSHIP

One: God's light rises for those who seek justice and truth.

All: We come to walk in the light of Christ.

One: Jesus calls us to lives shaped by humility, mercy, and courage.

All: We open our hearts to God's transforming grace.

One: Come, let us worship God together.

All: We worship God, whose wisdom brings life and hope.

OPENING PRAYER

Holy and gracious God, you call us not to power, but to love; not to pride, but to humility; not to fear, but to faithful living. As we gather in worship, shape our hearts and minds to reflect your justice, your mercy, and your compassion. Guide us in the way of Christ, that we may live as people of light in the world. Amen.

MOMENT TO PONDER

In today's readings, we are reminded that God's ways often challenge the values of the world. Through the prophet Micah and the teachings of Jesus in the Beatitudes, we hear that faith is not about power or success, but about lives shaped by justice, kindness, humility, and mercy. Jesus blesses those the world often overlooks and shows us that God's presence is found not in greatness as the world defines it, but in love lived quietly and faithfully.

There is a simple story of a child walking along a beach after a storm, gently picking up stranded starfish and tossing them back into the sea. An adult watching

said, "There are thousands of them, what difference can you make?" The child replied, as they threw another starfish back, "It made a difference to this one." As we pause, we are invited to reflect on where God may be calling us to live out our faith in small but meaningful ways; acts of kindness, mercy, and justice that may seem ordinary, yet reflect the wisdom and compassion of Christ at work in us.
